

Spotlight on: **Special Interest Group for Necrotizing Enterocolitis (SIGNEC)**



SIGNEC was established as a special interest group for necrotising enterocolitis (NEC) by Professor Minesh Khashu (Consultant Neonatologist Poole Hospital) in 2012 to help advance a field of neonatal medicine that is poorly understood and hadn't seen much progress for decades.

NEC continues to be the major cause of mortality and morbidity for preterm infants.

SIGNEC provides a platform for involvement of a wide range of healthcare professionals to facilitate

Prof. Khashu has cocreated a website for SIGNEC with a parent, Joanne Ferguson, who unfortunately lost a twin son to NEC. The website signec.org has been developed for parents and families to have a better understanding of NEC and help them in making more informed decisions. The website has been very well received by parents, charities, support groups as well as healthcare professionals.

Each year Prof. Khashu, on behalf of SIGNEC, organises an international conference which brings together world leading NEC experts to deliberate with neonatal doctors and nurses, surgeons, dieticians as well as parents. This years conference will be held on 29th and 30th October, at Chelsea Football Club, London.



World Sepsis Day 2018



Stroke-reducing heart implants and a life changing surgical procedure for children with cerebral palsy are among a [host of new treatments](#) that will now be routinely available for thousands of patients on the NHS. The move is the result of NHS England's latest specialised commissioning prioritisation process. The new treatments join a wealth of innovative treatments already available on the NHS, including kidney dialysis and revolutionary new treatments like 'tooth in eye' surgery which restores vision to blind patients by using part of the patient's own tooth root.

Deliver same-day care with help from new ambulatory emergency care (AEC) guides

Same-day care reduces admissions and improves patient experience. Three new AEC resources offer guidance and highlight good practice to help you do this.

The guides focus on how to: [identify a large cohort of patients](#) who can be safely treated on the same day; [optimise outcomes for frail older people](#); and avoid unnecessary admissions, reduce length of stay and improve flow [during winter](#).

Three new safe staffing improvement resources

To help standardise safe, sustainable and productive staffing decisions, NHSI have published safe staffing improvement resources for [children and young people's inpatient wards](#), [neonatal care](#) and [urgent and emergency care](#). These resources include recommendations for board accountability and outline expectations for clinical leaders.

Criteria-led discharge in practice


Criteria-led discharge improves both operational performance and patient experience, and two

new case studies have been added to NHSIs [improvement collaborative](#) showing how this can work in practice.

The oncology clinical service at [The Leeds Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust](#) developed and trialled a 'criteria-led discharge tool', and [Bradford District Care NHS Foundation Trust](#) created a discharge tracker for ward-based mental health patients.

Public Health England has relaunched their 'Blood in Pee' campaign, which encourages people to see a doctor if they notice blood in their urine, even if it is just the once. Bladder and kidney cancer are both in the top ten cancers most commonly diagnosed. Blood in urine is the main symptom of bladder cancer and a common symptom of kidney cancer. Funding available for experienced research teams. The Health Foundation have up to £1.8 million available for three to five experienced research teams through the latest round of their Efficiency Research Programme.

This programme is an open call for innovative research proposals to explore two critically important but under researched themes:

- Labour productivity in health and social care to bring about financial sustainability
- Workforce retention in health and social care to bring about workforce sustainability

Learning and insights of the Q Improvement Lab


